Notes:

Species reported but not included on the list include:

- Ring-necked Pheasant no longer self sustaining populations.
- Northern Bobwhite introduced; not self sustaining.
- Brewster's Warbler hybrid; the first in four years.

We experienced a major gull invasion this winter that brought gulls in high numbers and variety with record setting totals of rare species. This surpassed the previous invasion in 2007.

White-winged Scoters and Red-necked Grebes were numerous due to the freezing of the Great Lakes.

Two Red-throated Loons together in February were a notable seventh county record. All recent records have been of single birds.

Goose variety was its greatest with Greater White-fronted (December), Snow (March and November), Ross's (April and December) and Cackling (March and December) reported this year.

Two flyover Sandhill Cranes in April and a flock heard flying over after dark in November were rare for the county.

Notable county records in 2014:

- First county record of Yellow-crowned Night-Heron in April.
- Fourth county record of Least Bittern but the first since 1923.
- Fifth county record of American Avocet; a flyover.
- Two Laughing Gulls in July; fourth county record and first record of multiple individuals.
- Fourth county record of Nelson's Sparrow in October.

Rare here a Summer Tanager was heard singing in April.

A Slate-colored Fox Sparrow in January was the first record of this race in Pennsylvania. This subspecies is quite notable and rare in the east.
