Notes:

Ross's Goose – One at Allegheny Cemetery in Lawrenceville. One was at this location in 2014.

Ring-necked Pheasant - Reported but most birds these days are released so they are not considered wild.

Northern Bobwhite – a few were reported this year. All are introduced. Reports came from Jefferson Hills, Harrison Hills Park, Natrona Heights and Hays.

Black-crowned Night-Heron – One at North Park in August.

Glossy Ibis – A surprising record; one was entered into ebird with a photograph in Jefferson Hills in May. Unfortunately it did not remain in the area.

Black Vulture – One flying over Etna in May.

Sandhill Crane – Two flyover flocks in December.

Iceland Gull – One at the Point in December when the frigid weather arrived and water to the north froze.

Lesser Black-backed Gull – One at the Point in December.

Great Black-backed Gull – One at the Point in December.

Barn Owl – A recording was made of single birds in the middle of the night in May and surprisingly again in October.

Snowy Owl – Several reported late in the year including one in downtown Pittsburgh. Numerous owls moved south in the fall of 2016 in numbers with many around the Great Lakes.

Marsh Wren – One at Wingfield Pines in October.

Bullock's Oriole – An adult male visited a feeder in December; an exciting first county record.

Pine Siskin – Two in two locations in November.

Golden-winged Warbler – Now rare single birds were found at North Park and Boyce-Mayview Park.
